Ruha Benjamin will serve as this year's Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Commemoration keynote speaker. Dr. Benjamin is the Alexander Stewart 1886 Professor of African American Studies at Princeton University and a 2024 MacArthur Fellow. Her keynote, titled "Who Owns the Future? From Artificial Intelligence to Abundant Imagination," will address the social dimensions of science, medicine, and technology, focusing on the relationship between innovation and social inequity.



The Grange, officially known as the Order of Patrons of Husbandry, is a family-friendly fraternal organization with a rich history and a highly visible community presence. It is an example of democratic, grass-roots activism and is non-partisan at all levels. Its policies are established through debate, but in collaboration and unity. Community service is an integral part of the Grange.

In 1867, the National Grange became the first nationwide farm organization and was the first national organization to give full voice and vote to women, 60 years before the adoption of Universal Suffrage in the United States.

In the 1870s, the National Grange was the first national farm organization to attempt to organize African American farmers following the Civil War.
